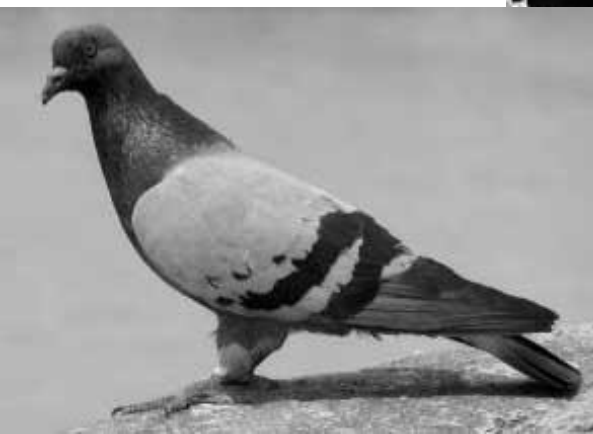
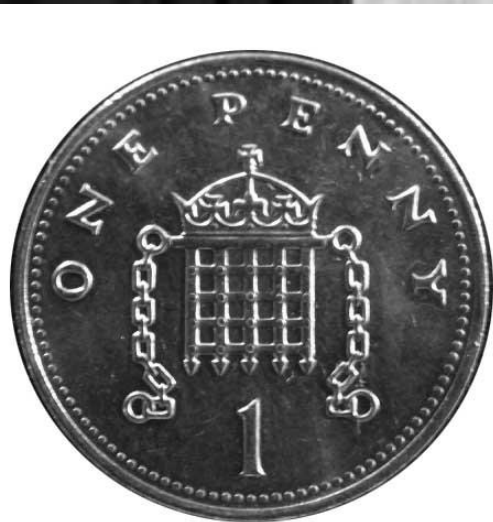


Intrinsic Motivation

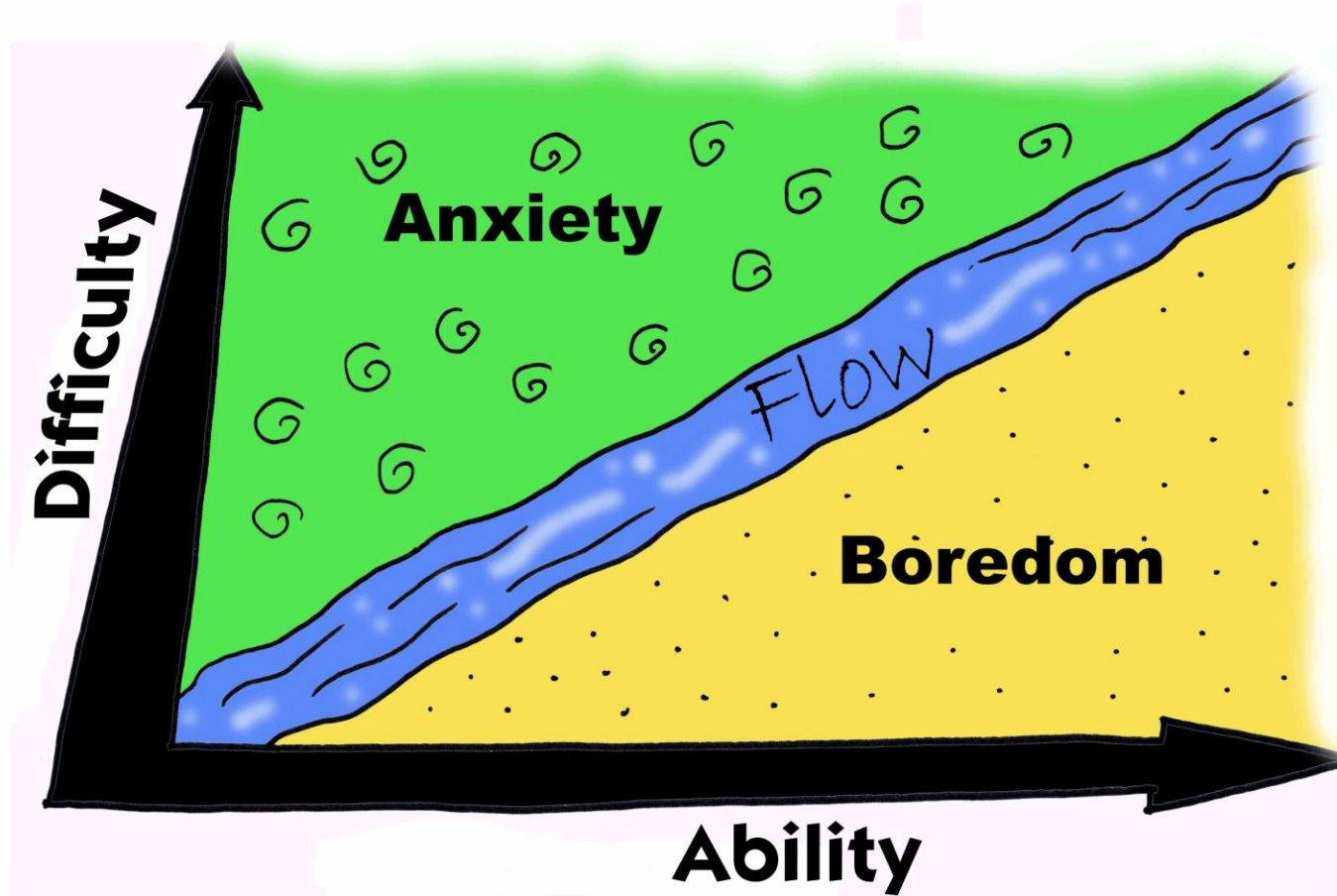
What people will do without external inducement.

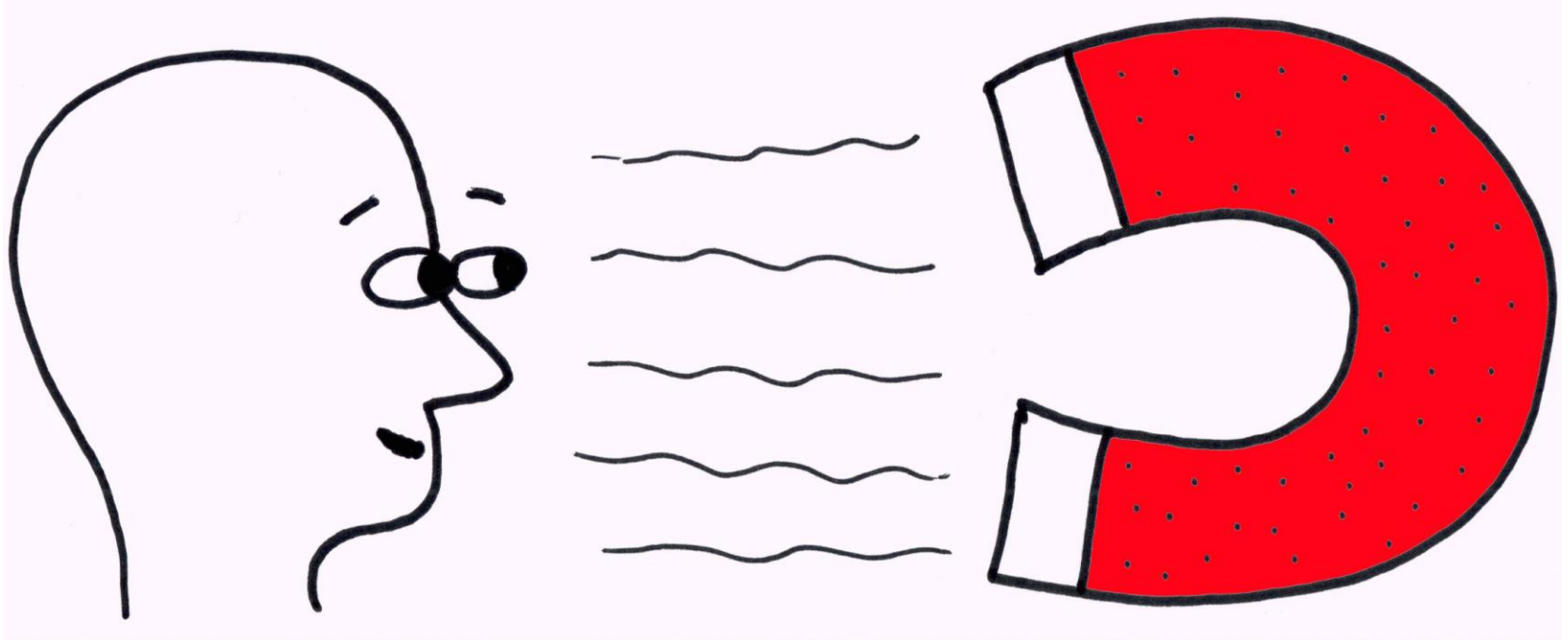
