



Syllabic consonants

The sounds /l/ and /n/ can often be 'syllabic' – that is, they can form a syllable by themselves without a vowel. There is a syllabic /l/ in the usual pronunciation of **middle** /'mɪdl/, and a syllabic /n/ in **sudden** /'sʌdn/.

Stress

The mark//shows the main stress in a word. Compare **able** /'eibl/, stressed on the first syllable, with **ability** /ə'biləti/, stressed on the second. A stressed syllable is relatively loud, long in duration, said clearly and distinctly, and made noticeable by the pitch of the voice.



Stress

When two words are put together in a phrase, the main stress in the first word may shift to the place of the secondary stress to avoid a clash between two stressed syllables next to each other. For instance, <code>after'noon</code> has the main stress on noon, but in the phrase <code>afternoon'tea</code> the stress on noon is missing.


